NOBEL LAUREATE ELIE WIESEL VISITS CHOATE Holocaust survivor and Nobel Laureate Elie Wiesel spoke at an all-school special program at the Paul Mellon Arts Center on April 28. Wiesel's topic was "Confronting Fanaticism: Building Moral Unity in a Diverse Society." "Hatred," Wiesel told a fully packed auditorium, "is like an infectious disease. It goes from cell to cell. Whoever hates one group, hates other groups. Whoever hates one minority, hates all minorities." He continued to ask the rhetorical questions: What can be done about it? What can students, eager to acquire knowledge, do about hatred or "indifference" in the world?

In conjunction with his remarks, Kati Marton P '00 was the 2009 Thalheimer Educator-in-Residence and guest speaker in history classes. Ms. Marton has successfully combined a career as a reporter and writer with human rights advocacy. ## HARVARD'S SHAWN ACHOR SPEAKS AT SPECIAL PROGRAM
